A LETTER FROM LEAD PASTOR REV. JULIE KLINE

Dear People of First United Methodist Church of Kalamazoo,

We have been in a season of staff transition and will continue to be for a time. We appreciate your prayers and your patience as we continue to navigate changes and find our way on a learning curve. As we have moved through this season, we have found that there have been challenges and opportunities. We believe that the light of Christ does indeed guide and provide wisdom as we seek solutions and continue to have a staff team dedicated to the ministries of our church.

Over the last several months we have had three people who have departed from our staff team and are onto new adventures: Ruth LaMachia, Casey Curran, and Robin Entenman although with thanksgiving Robin is still worshiping with us and is actively engaged in our prayer team and caring committee.

We have brought on two new people to our staff team: Ava Loncharte as Building Host and Drew Bolton as Building Superintendent. We have moved two people to new positions: Christi Landreville as Office Manager and Thom Victor as Technology Support Specialist.

Many of these changes have resulted in responsibilities being redistributed, thus several staff members are taking upon tasks that have required new learnings. For example, José Celorio our Communications Coordinator, now prepares our worship bulletins and worship slides. Christi Landreville has a multitude of responsibilities that are new for her, and she is discerning the best way to delegate tasks and balance her workload. Walt Whitfield is working closely with Christi as they dive deeper into all the nuances of our finances and are working with the Finance Team to clean up and streamline our systems. Thom Victor is troubleshooting as he uncovers our needs and shortcomings in our technology systems. Drew Bolton is learning the ins and outs of our large building that has a multitude of complexities and a need for consistent care and upkeep. Ava Loncharte has provided wonderful hospitality as she learns to guide and direct people to the people and places they want to go.

We also recognize that in times of transition, gaps can be created, and needs may not be addressed as they were in the past. We are still working on how we will address the needs of congregational care as we do not have a staff person who is solely responsible for this care at this time. Pastor Matt and I are doing our best to keep up with the most critical needs, tend to the dying, and comfort the grieving. If you feel called to help with visitation, calling, or sending cards to our elders and homebound, and those who are in times of need, please reach out to me. We are seeking leadership for our Caring Committee. Please pick up a magnet from the Welcome Desk for guidance on how you can contribute and engage in CARES (calls, acts of kindness, reach out, engage, spirit tending).

We are also working to build our Audio/Visual Team. We believe that our livestream worship is a vital way to connect beyond our church building. Each week, people depend upon our livestream worship to enliven their spirits and keep them engaged. Our sound and visual technicians enhance our worship experience in the sanctuary each week. We need people who are willing to learn the skills of using our wonderful equipment and become a part of the team that provides this ministry week after week. Please reach out to me if you are interested in helping to create a meaningful worship experience for those who are in the sanctuary and beyond.

There are many opportunities to be further involved in the ministries of FUMC. The above are just a few of the ways that people can be engaged. Contact me or any of the staff team and I am certain we could match your willingness to serve and participate within an area of ministry.

We have recently identified our new vision statement: We are a Christ-centered community where our stories are woven with God's story. We are in this ministry together, staff and laity as we create chapters to our story that are relevant, authentic, inspired, and entwined with the Divine. As staff, we are in transition to further learning, growing, and finding the light that heralds a new beginning. Join us with your prayers, presence, service, and witness, and let us create a community that values love, inclusion, community, and justice.


